A Word from the Interim President & Academic Dean

If you are reading this, chances are that you are considering the possibility of coming to Seminary, or know someone who might be thinking about it. Allow me to say a few words to assist you in your process of discernment.

From our humble beginnings through today, St Vladimir's Seminary has kept its focus on its call and commission to serve the Church by training men and women to be faithful witnesses to our Lord Jesus Christ and to serve as clergymen, teachers, preachers, and active apologists for the Orthodox Faith. We remain focused on academic, spiritual, and pastoral formation within a residential Pan-Orthodox community. The Seminary is a community of discernment for vocations, and this includes our institutional vocations.

Academic study is important at St Vladimir's Seminary, but theological education means more than a strictly academic pursuit. The proper context for studying Orthodox theology is spiritual formation that involves the entire person through prayer, study, and obedience to the will of God.

A fundamental reality must be acknowledged: no "standard mold" exists for a successful and faithful servant of the Church. God made all of us in His image, sharers in the common human nature, but He entrusted each one of us with the potential to grow into godlikeness as a unique person. At St Vladimir's Seminary, the Lord forges many kinds of servants to be sent into His vineyard: between God's call, your teachers' efforts, and your own openness to grow, you may become a serious academic, a skillful orator, a dedicated liturgical celebrant, an empathic listener, a missionary in the image of the "apostle to the nations," and so forth.

The purpose of St Vladimir's Orthodox Theological Seminary is to serve our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ by bearing witness to Him throughout the world.

Mission -

We train priests, lay leaders, and scholars to be active apologists of the Orthodox Christian Faith, focusing on academic rigor and spiritual formation within a residential Orthodox community.

Academic, Pastoral, and Spiritual Formation

At St Vladimir's Seminary, the goal of education is not simply the inculcation of knowledge or even critical thinking skills, but the formation of the whole person. By necessity, the formation of seminarians—as distinct from the formation that takes place in a purely academic environment—considers the entirety of the person, and, as such, focuses on three specific dimensions in which, by the grace of God, all seminarians will grow during their time at St Vladimir's Seminary:

- Academic Formation: not only completing the demands of a scholarly, rigorous graduate-level program but also practicing the ability to reflect upon that program of instruction wisely and prudently, as well as the ability to apply it pastorally in service of the Church and others.
 - Pastoral Formation: preparing to execute the duties of their calling, whether as a pastor, chaplain, or teacher or going on to contribute to the life of the Church through further academic studies or other vocations.
 - Spiritual Formation: becoming committed to a life of both personal prayer and corporate worship, fidelity to the Church, receiving ongoing direction, and showing a spirit of charity. The goal of spiritual development is to live faithfully in intimate and unceasing union with Jesus Christ and as a member of His Body, the Church.

Chapel Life

Orthodox theological education is uniquely and significantly tied to liturgical worship. Seminarians and their families are enriched, challenged, and instructed in Three Hierarchs Chapel, named for Sts Basil the Great, Gregory the Theologian, and John Chrysostom and consecrated in 1983. Our academics are inseparable from our daily worship, which provides the context for everything we do at the Seminary. This worship is the cornerstone of our spiritual formation.

St Vladimir's Seminary students participate in twice-daily services during weekdays in non-fasting seasons—Matins and Vespers—and thrice-daily services during weekdays in fasting seasons—Matins, Vespers, and Compline. Our worship also includes Saturday-evening Vigil and Sunday-morning Divine Liturgy, as well as special festal and Lenten celebrations. Students are assigned to take an active part in daily reading, serving, and preaching and participate in the seminary choirs.

Master of Divinity (M.Div.)

The Master of Divinity at St Vladimir's Seminary is a graduate professional degree designed primarily for qualified Orthodox seminarians preparing for ordination to the priesthood. It is also an appropriate degree for those preparing for hospital chaplaincy with certification in Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE). Additionally, the M.Div. prepares individuals for graduate studies in theology and related disciplines.

St Vladimir's Seminary is also the only Orthodox seminary in North America that requires CPE as part of the supervised practical experience within its M.Div. program. This allows the academic courses to be applied in both hospital/clinical ministries and parish ministries. Our director of field education works with the various jurisdictions in the placement of seminarians in area parishes under the supervision of mentors or senior pastors.

Our director of spiritual formation is also part of our M.Div. team supporting seminarians during their three years of residential life at St Vladimir's Seminary. Striking a balance between maintaining high academic standards, cultivating pastoral formation, and nurturing a healthy spiritual life is essential for preparing M.Div. seminarians for service to the Church.

Master of Divinity courses are divided into a core of foundational theology courses, specialized courses in applied theology and the practice of ministry, skills courses in practical liturgics and liturgical music, and elective courses. To prepare students for service in their church jurisdictions, St Vladimir's Seminary offers jurisdictionally specific courses in liturgics and liturgical music, and other areas as needed.

Master of Arts (M.A.)

The Master of Arts program at St Vladimir's Seminary is designed for those wishing to explore the major academic areas within the theological curriculum without the professional preparation required of candidates for ordination in the Orthodox Church. The program is designed to meet the needs of students preparing to pursue advanced doctoral studies or who feel called to serve in lay ministry roles in the Church.

The Master of Arts program is also intended for those of any profession or occupation who seek to acquire the "mind of Christ," as the Apostle Paul urged the Philippians, so that they might engage the world through their profession with that mind. To acquire the mind of Christ is a long process that begins with a daily encounter with God's word in study, service, and prayer, the essential components of a genuine Orthodox theological education and the pillars of the Master of Arts program at St Vladimir's Seminary.

Students who are admitted to the Master of Arts program complete a core curriculum of courses in the arts, history, liturgy, Scripture, and theology. They also have the opportunity to complete the requirements of a concentration of their choice.

St Vladimir's Seminary seeks to equip students in the Master of Arts program to read Scripture and patristics with discernment; to think theologically and pastorally about the world and their cultural context, addressing contemporary realities in a manner faithful to the Church's tradition; and to research and write at a scholarly level.

M.A. Concentrations:

Students have the option of adding to their M.A. program of studies a series of electives that would focus their work in one of two concentrations.

SACRED ARTS The M.A. program at St Vladimir's Seminary is an ideal context to immerse oneself directly into the sacred arts, as lived within the worship, theology, and overall experience of the Orthodox Faith.

This program is intended in particular for students and/or practitioners of music, choral conducting, iconography, architecture, art history, and other related disciplines, who wish to pursue greater meaning, understanding, and spiritual depth in their work—by understanding its place within the wider context of sacred arts, and specifically within the theological and liturgical world of Orthodox Christianity.

THEOLOGICAL SCHOLARSHIP AND RESEARCH is for those preparing for further graduate study in theology. Students who pursue the concentration in Theological Scholarship and Research continue their study of an ancient language, normally Biblical Greek, participate in seminars set aside for Th.M. students, and complete an honors thesis as their summative writing project.

Master of Theology (Th.M.)

The Master of Theology (Th.M.) at St Vladimir's Seminary prepares students for advanced theological research and to pursue a terminal academic degree.

Th.M. students are given concrete means to build upon their areas of expertise and talent. The student is the first beneficiary of this program, but theological training is always for the building up of the Church.

This program primarily targets qualified Orthodox students from the United States or abroad with a strong theological background (minimum requirements are a Master of Divinity degree or equivalent, along with a strong knowledge of at least one classical language–Greek, Latin, Hebrew, Armenian, etc.). Non-Orthodox students who wish to specialize in Orthodox studies are also more than welcome to apply to this program.

Th.M. seminars are led by carefully selected faculty members and focus on research methods that will equip students to engage in advanced theological reflection, research, and theological writing at a scholarly level suitable for peer-reviewed publications. The expected step after graduating from this program is to continue with a terminal academic degree in different fields of theology, but ordination (for those with a Master of Divinity degree) is always encouraged.

The six mandatory Th.M. seminars are held annually and concentrate on selected topics of Orthodox studies: Church history, canon law, liturgical theology, patristics, biblical studies, and dogmatics. Additionally, these seminars can be complemented by other electives offered by St Vladimir's Seminary, Fordham University, or other schools from the New York Theological Consortium (Union Theological Seminary, General Theological Seminary, New York Theological Seminary, and Hebrew Union College).

Monthly invitations to academic events that include faculty research seminars, discussing their best final papers in the twice-yearly graduate student conferences, and the final thesis public defense with the participation of their peers and professors are all excellent opportunities to propel our Master of Theology students to the next level of advanced theological research.

Doctor of Ministry (D.Min.)

The Doctor of Ministry degree at St Vladimir's Seminary enhances the practice of ministry for ordained and lay ministers in the Orthodox Church. The program integrates enhanced competencies in pastoral analysis with skills necessary to lead students to an advanced understanding of the nature and purposes of ministry. The D.Min. program at St Vladimir's Seminary provides priests, chaplains, and other pastoral professionals with advanced knowledge and skills, so that they bring the gospel of Jesus Christ to those who are suffering. Integrating doctoral-level academic work with pastoral spirituality, this program will help you to acquire and refine the skills to minister to those whom God has called you to serve. Clinical Pastoral Education

St Vladimir's Seminary is the only Orthodox Christian seminary in the United States that offers Clinical Pastoral Education (CPE) programs to its students accredited by the Association of Clinical Pastoral Education (ACPE). ACPE currently accredits over 300 CPE programs offered in hospitals, prisons, churches, seminaries, community-based organizations, and other settings across the United States.

CPE brings theological students and ministers of all faiths (pastors, priests, rabbis, imams, and others) into supervised encounters with persons in crisis. Out of an intense involvement with persons in need, and the feedback from peers and supervisors, students develop new awareness of themselves as persons and of the needs of those to whom they minister. From theological reflection on specific human situations, they gain a new understanding of ministry. Within the interdisciplinary team process of helping persons, they develop skills in interpersonal and interprofessional relationships.

All ACPE-accredited CPE consists of a minimum of 400 hours: 300 clinical hours and 100 educational hours in small group and individual supervision. CPE is an experience in process education. The heart of CPE is ministry with people and learning through reflection, discussion, and evaluation with other students and supervisors.

At St Vladimir's Seminary, CPE is an integral requirement for seminarians in the M.Div. program, and an option for M.A. & Th.M. students. All M.Div. students are required to complete a unit of ACPE CPE at any accredited center in the United States. A second CPE Unit (parish-based) is offered as an option at St Vladimir's Seminary. St Vladimir's Seminary hires an ACPE-certified educator to prepare students for hospital-based CPE, to lead the CPE Units at St Vladimir's Seminary in accordance with the ACPE Standards, and to maintain all the ACPE accreditation requirements; all ACPE programs are reviewed for re-accreditation every three years (by portfolio materials) and every six years (through a site visit).

The Clinical Pastoral Education hours through St Vladimir's Seminary include:

- 100 hours of face-to-face education (group and individual supervision)
- A Clinical Placement Agreement for 300 hours of spiritual care at one or two locations (usually a parish and/or a hospital). These agreements require the involvement of a clinical site mentor, who verifies the spiritual care provided and provides observation and feedback on the student's ministry.

The Institute of Sacred Arts (ISA) at St Vladimir's Seminary



The Institute of Sacred Arts at St Vladimir's Seminary explores the intersection of human creativity and holiness.

With a theology that is holistic, and a Liturgy that unites multiple artistic disciplines and all the human senses, the Orthodox Christian tradition is a fitting context for the exploration and celebration of the sacred arts.

Since its founding in 1938, St Vladimir's Seminary has fostered the immersive study of the Liturgy, and of the visual, musical, and rhetorical arts. The Institute of Sacred Arts serves to extend the Seminary's mission in exploring the mutual relationship between theology and the arts by:

- Contributing to the work of people and institutions that practice and reflect on the sacred arts;
- Engaging people and institutions of all backgrounds with Orthodox Christian artistic tradition;
- Inspiring wider public interest in spirituality and the arts.

The Institute finds its expression in a curriculum infused with the arts, academic symposia and conferences, and publications and cultural events.

St Vladimir's Seminary is now offering an M.A. degree with a concentration in Sacred Arts, facilitated by the Institute of Sacred Arts. The concentration features coursework in both theoretical and applied theology and the arts, with opportunities to specialize in a particular discipline: music, iconology, art history, liturgy, architecture, et al. Numerous opportunities for in-depth study and creative collaboration with sacred arts scholars from a range of disciplines include subsidized internships and an annual artist-in-residence program.

Our M.A. curriculum draws on our resident faculty as well as a number of world-class affiliated artists and scholars willing to work with seminarians as mentors and project advisors.

The Master of Arts program at St Vladimir's Seminary is a is a two-year residential program. It offers a well-rounded course of studies in Orthodox Christian theology, with courses in biblical and historical studies, liturgy, patristics, and systematic theology.

The concentration in sacred arts consists in seminar and lecture courses:

- An Introductory Seminar that introduces and explores fundamental principles common to the theology and practice of sacred arts. Drawing on case studies of specific works of art/architecture/music, the course will explore historical context as well as function within and outside the liturgy, past and present. The course will also introduce issues of aesthetics, canonicity, tradition, and innovation.
- Courses tying together the various sacred arts, through categories such as **theological aesthetics** and **liturgy**. These focus on the hermeneutics of the arts in the Church, as well as the role of the arts in constituting the liturgy, and the role of the liturgy in giving coherence to its constitutive arts.

Academic Events

Each year, St Vladimir's Seminary hosts a variety of events open to the student community and the general public, including keynote presentations given by honored guests, concerts, webinars, and roundtable discussions by scholars in academic fields related to theology or sacred art. Some annually recurring events are:

Annual Academic Symposium: This three-day conference focuses on a different area of theological study each year, and is attended by top-notch international scholars; the proceedings are published after each annual conference.

Schmemann Memorial Lecture: Held every year since the repose of Protopresbyter Alexander Schmemann on the Feast of the Three Holy Hierarchs (January 30), featuring prominent speakers on key theological topics.

Institute of Sacred Arts Roundtable Discussion: A diverse panel of Orthodox sacred artists gathers periodically to deliver a dynamic joint presentation and Q&A session, discussing topics pertaining to the role of the arts in the practice of the Orthodox Faith.

Faculty Seminar: Every month during the academic year (September through May) the Seminary faculty gather for an in-person or online presentation by an invited speaker, followed by a robust Q&A session. Seminarians on the Dean's List are also invited to participate.

The Father Georges Florovsky Library

The Father Georges Florovsky Library at St Vladimir's Seminary is a Pan-Orthodox resource serving all levels of St Vladimir's Seminary's institutional mission and vision, as well as scholars and researchers worldwide. It is dedicated to providing for the multifaceted research needs of its local and international community—academic, liturgical, and pastoral—in order to form and cultivate future leaders and servants in the Orthodox Church and the academy.

The library's commitment to developing a collection in many languages serves the Seminary's Pan-Orthodox mission. Moreover, while the library serves the needs of students, faculty, and staff, it also serves researchers worldwide who are studying the Orthodox Church. It is an archival library for the Orthodox Church in America and serves the other Orthodox jurisdictions in North America. It features special collections that include historical materials such as books, pamphlets, and video and audio recordings of lectures and music.

Given that the Orthodox Church prioritizes the historical tradition of Scripture and patristics, the library has extensive holdings and a reputation for its collections in these areas. In addition, the library offers a service known as "the Lyceum." The Lyceum is a resource that provides a setting for students to hone and improve their academic thinking, writing, and presentation skills. Its fundamental purpose is to foster a marketplace of ideas and promote intellectual inquiry among the student body, thereby aiding students in their journey to cultivate their own unique contributions to coursework, parish life, academic conferences, or publications. For all of these reasons, the library equitably services all of the Seminary's degree programs: the M.Div., M.A., Th.M., and D.Min.

Given the library's commitment to the academic formation of the student body, seminarians will leave St Vladimir's Seminary prepared to take on the challenges that face them in the outside world.

SVS Press is the largest publisher of Orthodox Christian books in the English language—housing over 500 titles.

The mission of SVS Press is to partner with reputable authors and translators worldwide in order to produce and distribute rich theological texts that preserve the Orthodox Faith, tradition, and history, while also fostering a platform for new theological and academic works of excellence.

The SVS Press team is committed to building and maintaining a catalog of works covering a variety of topics, not limited to the following: theology, history, ecclesiology, ecumenism,



St Vladimir's

Online School of Theology

St Vladimir's Seminary now offers a growing catalog of online non-degree courses. Over the last few years, St Vladimir's Seminary has increased its online presence through a vibrant website, live-streaming, and active social media pages, as well as hybrid degree programs. The St Vladimir's Online School of Theology, inaugurated in June 2023, has offered online courses on patristics, Old Testament, and the sacred arts, and will eventually expand into certification and possibly M.A. degree programs. Director of Online Education Arpina Nakashian (M.A. '15), is overseeing the development of all online programming.

St Vladimir's Seminary received a five-year grant from Lilly Endowment Inc. to take the initial steps into the cyber world of edtech. The goal is to unfold the following non-degree online programs in accordance with the timeline of the proposal: Introductory Theological Studies, Parish Clergy Education Program, Lay Catechist Certification Program, and Advanced Skills for Lay Leaders. Furthermore, the online programs for St Vladimir's Online School of Theology will be carefully developed based on St Vladimir's Seminary's current offerings and other elements.

The programs are designed to serve a range of participants. This includes the general public who is curious about what the Orthodox Church has to offer; Orthodox laity who wish to deepen their knowledge and commitment to Orthodoxy; ordained and lay ministers who have the desire to pursue further theological studies; and parish laity who aspire to learn more skills in order to serve their respective parishes.

St Vladimir's Seminary's online programming encompasses various software to enhance online learning. Moreover, short and long multimedia resources are produced to support each respective program and redesigned for the purposes of social media learning. Furthermore, St Vladimir's Online School of Theology has its own platform to host all the programs we are offering: online.svots.edu. Both synchronous and asynchronous programs will be easily accessible on this website.

As the Seminary equips itself to educate online, it expands on opportunities to share the gospel and train the faithful in the modern world.

St Vladimir's Seminary is committed to being a residential Orthodox Christian community. We believe it's impossible to adequately form priests and church leaders over the internet. We hope you will be numbered among those Orthodox Christians who live in community with us—a rare and challenging opportunity. One of the enriching qualities of St Vladimir's Seminary is the diversity of our students: we are single and married, male and female, fresh out of college or coming from established careers, and hailing from many Orthodox jurisdictions in the US and abroad. Student Interest Groups

St Ambrose Society

The St Ambrose Society seeks to raise awareness of, to promote, and to obey the Church's teachings by hosting seminars and lectures on pro-life issues. Each month, members gather to pray a Paraklesis to the Mother of God for the victims and families of victims of abortion, and once a year, the society participates in the March for Life in Washington, D.C.

St Demetrios Fitness and Fellowship Society

The St Demetrios Fitness and Fellowship Society is a platform through which our community can come together in fellowship and maintain a healthy lifestyle, aiding in the formation we strive to achieve while at seminary. This society creates an opportunity for regular physical activity on a more communal level so that, in addition to the soul and mind "workouts" we get through classes, personal prayer, and chapel life, we may maintain our physical health as well.

Forty-five years after the repose of former dean, Archpriest Georges Florovsky (1893–1979), his vision of giving St Vladimir's Seminary a definite Pan-Orthodox orientation is still being fulfilled here every day. Orthodox Christians from almost every jurisdiction and continent stand side-by-side in worship, study, and fellowship at our chapel, in our classrooms, and even at lunch. Vespers and matins are served and chanted according to the rubrics of the Antiochian Orthodox Archdiocese each week; unique courses in music, liturgics, history, and more are offered every semester for Orthodox traditions outside of the Orthodox Church in America (OCA), including Oriental Orthodox traditions; chapels have been established on campus for students from the Coptic and Syriac/Malankara traditions to learn and practice serving in their respective rites; and special scholarships have enabled seminarians from Serbian, African, Georgian, Syriac, and other churches to be educated and trained here at St Vladimir's Seminary. In addition, 2024 will mark fifty-five years of cooperation between St Vladimir's Seminary and the nearby St Nersess Armenian Seminary.

At every Seminary gathering or event, Orthodox Christians of every background engage in loving Christian fellowship and high-level discussions. This kind of Pan-Orthodox activity is difficult to find on this scale and with this frequency anywhere else in the world. Tragically, jurisdictional disputes abound, and too many Orthodox Churches are arguably becoming even more insular. But St Vladimir's Seminary continues to resist that trend. The Seminary is constantly in discussions to increase our cooperation with other Orthodox jurisdictions and to create new offerings in our curriculum to better meet the needs of their respective traditions. Pan-Orthodoxy is not just a dream at St Vladimir's Seminary. It is *lived* here.

International Students

Students come from all over the world to attend St Vladimir's Seminary. The international student body provides a unique and rich blend of different people, cultures, and educational experiences. This international presence helps to encourage dialogue, valuable exchange, and a tangible sense of unity in Christ among students of all nations.

International applicants are strongly encouraged to apply as soon as possible, as the visa process may take additional time due to backlogs at embassies.

Academic Requirements

Transcripts are required from all post-secondary accredited institutions attended in the original language and with a certified English translation. Applicants may be required to obtain a US equivalency of their international degrees from a US-based company (Morningside, etc.).

Language Requirements

In order to undertake a program of study at St Vladimir's Seminary, international students must demonstrate that they have attained a level of proficiency in English that is sufficient for graduate-level studies. The usual basis for evaluation is the Test of English as a Foreign Language (TOEFL) of the Educational Testing Service (www.ets.org/toefl). The Seminary's TOE-FL Institute Code is 2804. The minimum TOEFL iBT scores required are 96 (M.Div.), 100 (M.A.), and 104 (Th.M. and D.Min.). TOEFL waivers will be considered for applicants who have earned a degree from a college or university in the United States, or from a non-US university where the primary language of instruction is English, as long as there is sufficient evidence that the applicant has attained the level of proficiency in English required for graduate-level studies.

Legal Requirements

A certified English translation of the applicant's criminal record, issued by a competent authority, is required.

Immigration Requirements

Upon receiving an offer of admission, all international applicants must complete the Application and Certification of Financial Support for Form I-20 and pay the required deposits. The Seminary will then be able to issue Form I-20, the document that allows them to apply for an F-1 student visa at a US embassy or US consulate. As part of the visa application, international students must demonstrate that sufficient funds are available to cover academic and living expenses incurred during the duration of their presence in the United States. Students will be able to travel to the United States to begin their studies only after their F-1 visa has been issued by the US Embassy.

Application Process

The Seminary will consider applications for admission to its programs from all qualified Orthodox students who wish to prepare themselves for priestly ministry in the Orthodox Church, missionary work, teaching, or other forms of church service. Qualified non-Orthodox students may also be admitted and receive academic degrees and credit for their work.

In its admissions policy, as in the administration of its programs—educational, financial aid, student activities, and all others—St Vladimir's Seminary does not discriminate on the basis of race, age, color, gender, disability, or national or ethnic origin.

Deadlines

Admissions Open: February 1-June 1


St Vladimir's Seminary operates a rolling admissions procedure beginning February 1 and ending May 1, with a late application deadline of June 1. Prospective students who apply after May 1 will be charged a late application fee and have lower priority for housing and financial aid.

Deadline for Financial Aid Applications: April 1 The deadline for all financial aid applications, including need-based grants, need-based scholarships, and merit-based scholarships, is April 1. Applications for financial aid submitted after the deadline will be considered only if funds remain available. Notifications of financial aid awards are normally issued with offers of admission.

Application Requirements

All application materials and guidelines are available through the online Admissions Portal at www.svots.edu/apply. All applications and documents must be submitted through the online Admissions Portal.

All applicants must complete and submit the General Application form as well as complete and/or submit the following:



- 2. A copy of the applicant's Baptism/Chrismation certificate;
- **3.** A fully completed and signed background check consent form;
- **4.** Official transcripts from each graduate or undergraduate institution attended (must be sent directly from the institution/s);



- **5.** A letter of recommendation from a pastor or spiritual father;
- **6.** Two letters of recommendation from a professor, employer, or colleague;
- 7. An interview with the Director of Admissions; and
- 8. An interview with the designated Program Director.

Admissions Requirements for Degrees

Personal Interviews and Campus Visits

Personal interviews are required for all applicants. Online interviews are possible for those living at great distances from the Seminary. Personal interviews will be scheduled by the Director of Admissions.

Personal interviews may be combined with a campus visit. Campus visits are an excellent opportunity for applicants to attend classes, participate in chapel services, and meet faculty members. Campus visits may be arranged by contacting the Director of Admissions.

Required Deposits

Upon receiving an offer of admission, all admitted students must submit a non-refundable enrollment deposit and a refundable housing security deposit.


Tuition-Free Initiative

The initiative, which launched in 2012, offers fully paid tuition to seminarians to free them of the burden of tuition debt as they go forth to serve the Church. About 95% of St Vladimir's Seminary students take advantage of this program.

Need-based tuition grants (M.Div., M.A., and Th.M. programs) consist of two components: (1) an outright tuition grant and (2) a matching grant opportunity. Outright grants are applied directly against a student's tuition; matching grant funds are awarded on a dollar-to-dollar basis with funds received from outside ecclesial bodies or organizations, such as dioceses, parishes, parish organizations, church aid organizations, or church scholarship funds.

Example: If a student were awarded a need-based tuition grant of 50% in outright grant money and 25% from a donor matching opportunity, then the student would receive \$6,500 in grant money and the possibility of receiving up to \$3,250 more from the seminary to match the \$3,250 received from a donor matching opportunity from outside sources. In this example, tuition would be fully funded.

95% of M.Div, M.A., and Th.M. students take advantage of the tuition-free program



Tuition and Fees

Charges for tuition, fees, and room & board are due and payable at the beginning of each semester. Full-time students may make arrangements with the Chief Financial Officer to pay these fees in installments, subject to a finance charge, the first of which is due at the beginning of the semester. All accounts must be paid in full for the previous term before the student is permitted to register for a new semester. If payment or other satisfactory arrangements have not been made by the end of the second week of the semester, the student will not be permitted to attend classes until payment or other arrangements have been made.



Fees & Expenses

Tuition and fees are set annually by the Board of Trustees and are subject to change at the Board's discretion. Tuition, fees, and estimates of other expenses for the following academic year are posted online each year in early February.

Residential Housing

Married Student Housing Married students may move into their apartments after August 15. Married students are responsible for monthly rent and utility bills. Apartments range in size from one- to three-bedroom facilities and include a kitchen with stove, refrigerator, and dishwasher. Coin-operated laundry facilities are available in the basement. Apartments are unfurnished.

Dormitory Housing Dormitory students may move in the day before orientation begins. Each room is supplied with a twin (long) bed, a dresser, a desk and chair, and closet space. Bathroom facilities in each residence hall are shared. Male and female students are housed in separate areas and floors.

Off-Campus Housing Restrictions On-campus residency is mandatory for all students enrolled in the M.Div. program and for all students receiving financial aid from the Seminary. Should a situation arise that requires a student to live off campus, the student must petition the director of residential life and outline the reasons why his or her request should be granted. If a blessing is given, the student is responsible for the market rate of the rental as well as for all seminary responsibilities.

Financial Aid

St Vladimir's Seminary awards and distributes its financial resources with a view toward Christian charity and stewardship. Most seminary students receive some form of financial assistance, and students should be mindful that such aid is a privilege to be enjoyed thanks to many benefactors who have graciously given funds to the Seminary.



Financial Aid

All students are considered financially independent. Therefore, parental information is not required to determine need. The Seminary does, however, require financial information from spouses of married students and full disclosure of grant and scholarship assistance from outside sources, such as, but not limited to, parish, diocesan, and archdiocesan education funds.

Each semester's financial aid is applied toward the student's seminary account at the time of registration. Seminary awards are given with the understanding that the student will be in attendance for the full semester.

Eligibility for Financial Aid

To be eligible for financial aid from St Vladimir's Seminary, a student must 1) live on campus (if enrolled in a residential program); 2) be enrolled at the Seminary on a full-time basis as a degree candidate; and 3) be making satisfactory progress toward completion of the degree. To be considered full-time, students must be enrolled for at least twelve credits per semester; D.Min. students must be enrolled for six credits per term while registered for coursework and three credits per term during their final project registration. To be eligible for US Government loans, students must be degree candidates and enrolled for at least six credits per semester.

Types of Financial Aid

Grants and Scholarships

The Seminary administers need-based tuition grants, need-based scholarships, merit scholarships (Th.M. program only), and continuing education grants (D.Min. program only). Awards are made annually but are distributed one semester or term at a time to eligible students, as defined above. The amount given per semester or term will normally be one-half the total award for the year.

Matching Grant Opportunity

Need-based tuition grants (M.Div., M.A., and Th.M. programs) consist of two components: 1) an outright tuition grant and 2) a matching grant opportunity. Outright grants are applied directly against a student's tuition; matching grant funds are awarded on a dollar-to-dollar basis with funds received from outside ecclesial bodies or organizations, such as dioceses, parishes, parish organizations, church aid organizations, or church scholarship funds. Funds received from private individuals do not qualify for matching grant funds.

US Government Loan Programs

The Seminary participates in the William D. Ford Federal Direct Loan Program. This program allows students to borrow funds to help meet their educational costs at the post-secondary level, and is available to US citizens and permanent-resident aliens. Applicants must be in good academic standing and enrolled at least half-time, and they may not be in default on any previous loans.
